

Message from the Health Commissioner

The Meigs County Health Department (MCHD) provides services to Meigs County residents through its many programs and grants. Our services address issues such as sanitation, nutrition, immunization, chronic diseases, childhood obesity, and many more. With the ever-changing face of public health, we strive to address the needs of the rural community in which we serve. As a nationally accredited health department, we use the 10 Essential Public Health Services as a framework for public health to protect and promote health for our target audience of Meigs County residents. While our services are extensive, we can group them into 5 categories:

- 1. Public Health Nursing
- 2. Emergency Preparedness
- 3. Environmental Health
- 4. Vital Statistics
- 5. WIC (Women, Infants & Children)

Funded by the Health Services Levy of Meigs County, the Meigs County Health Department offers Public Health Nursing (PHN) services to residents of Meigs County. Public Health Registered Nurses administer immunizations to residents of all ages according to CDC Guidelines including outreach clinics, in addition to regular immunization clinics. PHN Services are offered regardless of the persons' ability to pay thus bridging the poverty gap that might otherwise prevent an individual from receiving basic preventive medicine care. Our nursing staff also conducts a wide variety of tests and health screenings. Registered Nurses operate the Children with Medical Handicaps (CMH) Program, a supplemental, income-based insurance program for those aged birth to 23 years with qualifying medical conditions. Registered Nurses also provide Maternal and Child Health education as MCHD staff can commonly be seen speaking with our county's youth in the local schools. Additionally, the MCHD obtains the Creating Healthy Communities (CHC) program which works to provide playground equipment, walking paths, and much more in our community.

Emergency Preparedness creates peace of mind that if a local disaster were to occur, a plan is already in place to provide assistance to the residents of Meigs County. In addition to plans, the MCHD has multiple resources to be utilized. A mobile hospital can be quickly deployed to provide shelter for medical procedures and exams or to provide a command center in the event of inclement weather. Partnerships have been developed with other county agencies that have been tasked with the responsibility of dealing with emergencies. These partners share expertise, equipment, and manpower in the mitigation of emergencies. Plans have been developed and are continually reviewed and updated to guide actions and responses to emergencies.

Environmental Health works to complete inspections on many county services to ensure proper practices for public consumption. This includes routine inspections of all food services providers, public swimming pools,

campgrounds/state parks, and schools. Private well and spring water testing is also available. Additionally, the division of Environmental Health provides knowledge when planning for new septic systems as well as financial assistance for failing septic systems for qualifying residents. The MCHD staff works with the public when there is an animal bite, issues with indoor pests such as bed bugs, and outdoor issues such as preventing mosquito and tick-borne diseases. Services anywhere from grabbing dinner or getting a tattoo are inspected by the MCHD staff to ensure the safety of our community.

Vital Statistics provide Meigs County residents with birth and death records. Any birth or death occurring since 1909 can be obtained via the Vital Statistics office at the MCHD. Genealogy assistance is available to the community upon request. A kiosk is available to provide information from 1964-present.

The MCHD has Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants & Children (WIC). WIC is a grant funded program for supplemental foods, health care referrals, and nutrition education for low-income pregnant, breastfeeding, and non-breastfeeding postpartum women, and to infants and children up to age 5 who are found to be at nutritional risk. The MCHD staff provides health education by a Registered Nurse and information by a Certified Lactation Consultant for breast feeding mothers participating in the WIC program. A Breastfeeding Peer is also available at the MCHD. The Breastfeeding Peer is of the same age as most WIC participants, and is currently or has recently, breast fed a child. The Breastfeeding Peer can relate well to the WIC participants and provide experience-based advice and education.

The previously listed services and many more are offered at the MCHD daily. The MCHD maintains a forward focused mindset and will continue to add services as we see fit. Our staff is Meigs County proud and works very hard to provide services to the public. Knowing all the details of the services provided is a gentle reminder for me that it is a privilege to serve the people of Meigs County. RIDES TO COMMUNITY IMMUNITY

ODOT awarded the Meigs County Health Dept. \$15,000 to offer County residents transportation assistance to medical appointments via the State's Rides to Community Immunity Program. The MCHD contracted with Meigs Co. Jobs and Family Services to provide the rides. From the middle of 2021- 12/31/22, 530 rides were provided via the collaboration. All but \$137.60 of the \$15,000 was expended.

2022 PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

"PROJECT DAWN" PROGRAM (Deaths Avoided with Naloxone) to address opioid overdoses in an attempt to save lives:

- 239 Naloxone kits provided to 112 community residents
- 39 Naloxone kits provided to 30 Law Enforcement and First Responders
- Trainings were facilitated at Meigs County Department of Job and Family Services Mobility Management, Eastern Local School District Staff Health Fair, Meigs County Firefighters Association, and Columbia Township Volunteer Fire Dept.

COVID TESTS

The MCHD collaborated with the Meigs County District Public Library in distribution of at-home COVID-19 tests. Approximately 600 were provided for distribution in addition to what ODH provided them.









CHILDREN WITH MEDICAL HANDICAPS

'CMH', the program for Children with Medical Handicaps, previously known as 'BCMH' is a comprehensive health care program funded in part by the Ohio Department of Health. The Meigs County CMH program served 127 families with an average monthly caseload of 78 children in Meigs County in 2022. These families were eligible to receive personalized service coordination in addition to secondary health care coverage that may have included medications, copays, diagnostic procedures, physician visits, and even equipment that they may not have been able to afford otherwise.

The CMH program is multifaceted with 3 main components for eligibility. The 'Diagnostic program' is a 6–9-month coverage that covers diagnostic testing, with medical eligibility being the only determinate (no income limit). These medically eligible families still benefit from the coverage of testing and studies that can sometimes be astronomical in cost in finding the appropriate diagnosis during that 6–9-month period. The 'Treatment program' is a more comprehensive coverage that is renewed annually and requires yearly financial and diagnostic eligibility. Many local families benefit from this program for their medications, procedures, and equipment/supplies. Unlike Medicaid and other similar programs, CMH considers multiple factors in income including medical costs accrued. The 'Service Coordination program' provides ongoing assistance with a selected service provider and local public health nurse, this program is not financially restrictive but is selective in diagnosis that qualify. Although each program stands alone, many children join the program participating in all 3 simultaneously. All programs provide public health nurse services, meaning personalized service coordination.

As part of the public health nurse services, Meigs County CMH served 17 families in collaboration with other agencies including Early Intervention, Integrated Services, Hopewell Health Centers, and FCFC (Family and Children's First Council) as well as many local schools. Meigs County families benefit greatly from the collaboration of agencies within the FCFC 'Inter-systems' program. Within this grant funded program, each qualifying family receives monthly meetings with a 'wrap-around' service approach that includes all participating agencies to provide individualized and effective interventions for families. Whatever the need, the monthly meetings help to highlight each family and open the door to resources to improve their daily life.

The CMH program strives to reach all eligible families in Meigs County to ensure proper medical care and service coordination needs for each child by developing community partners, and attending community meetings and events.

PROGRESS ON PUBLIC HEALTH ACCREDITATION IN 2022

- The MCHD participated in a Site Visit with the Public Health Accreditation Board (PHAB) in January 2020. An Action Plan was received in September 2020 and completed in November 2021. A final review from PHAB concluded with the MCHD being awarded National Accreditation as of March 2022. An Open House was held April 6 in celebration, which was attended by staff, BOH members, stakeholders, and State Representative Jay Edwards.
- Started the planning process for PHAB Reaccreditation efforts due in 2027.
- Participated in 3 Get Healthy Meigs! meetings along with more than 25 other agencies.
- Courtney Midkiff and Michelle Willard have continued to serve as Chair and Secretary of Get Healthy Meigs! respectively.
- Started work on the MCHD's 2022-2025 Community Health Assessment (CHA) in partnership with Holzer Health System and Gallia, Jackson, and Vinton County Health Departments.
- ❖ Updated the MCHD Strategic Plan in coordination with Mission Met.
- The Accreditation Team (Michelle Willard, Courtney Midkiff, Leanne Cunningham, Juli Simpson, Shawn Cunningham, Steve Swatzel, Sherry Eagle, Marc Barr) participated in The Ohio State University's Community Scientist Academy (CSA) training.

WOMEN, INFANTS, AND CHILDREN PROGRAM

The WIC Program serves income eligible pregnant, breastfeeding, and postpartum women, infants, and children up to age five who are at risk due to inadequate nutrition, health care, or both. The goal of ODH in releasing funds for the WIC Program is to protect and improve the health status and prevent health problems and promote good health within this population. This is accomplished through provision of a health and diet screening; individual and group nutrition education sessions; breastfeeding education and support; referral to prenatal and pediatric health care and other maternal and child health and human services programs; and provision of supplemental, highly nutritious foods. The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) provides the funding for all state WIC programs. The USDA is an equal opportunity provider and employer.

Served an average of 376 income eligible participants as of the Close-Out Report for fiscal year 2022 including:

- ❖ 19 Exclusively Breastfeeding Women

- ❖ 21 Post-Partum Women

- ❖ 94 Other Infants ages 0 to 12 Months
- ❖ 148 Total Children ages 1 to 5 years


2022 Projects and Successes

- Continued promotion of a Complete Street policy in Pomeroy, which aims to support inclusion of all modes of transportation. They have received several pedestrian crossing signs and paint to help encourage pedestrian safety and awareness for W. 2nd street and Court Street.
- General Hartinger Park was upgraded with paved access that surrounds the baseball fields. This paved trail is an added benefit for the community, especially those with mobility issues.
- The Village of Syracuse has received four new solar powered pedestrian crossing signs to help promote safe community park access and increase physical activity.
- Bike racks and a repair station installed at the Pomeroy Levee to support and encourage biking in the community.
- Cedar raised garden beds, rain barrels, and standing decks were purchased for the future of Rutland's Community Garden.
- Lindsey Jeffers attended village council meetings in Pomeroy and Treat Street 2023.
- Creating Healthy signs were placed at Angela Eason Memorial Park, Pomeroy bike racks, Chester United Methodist basketball court, and Middleport Park Trail to bring awareness of Creating Healthy Communities projects to the community.
- Forked Run State Park has received three new water bottle fillers. These water bottle fillers will be placed near local trails to attract visitors and to encourage visitors to stay hydrated during outdoor activities.
- Creating Healthy Communities Coalition held 3 meetings in 2022. The Coalition team is built of community members who focus and provide input on Meigs County's growth, health, and active living.
- Chester's United Methodist Church has received two new outdoor basketball systems and assistance with funds for resurfacing the court. This project will provide a safe and durable area for the community to engage in healthy activities.













Public Health Emergency Preparedness (PHEP) Grant is a federal grant administered through the Ohio Department of Health (ODH) to coordinate and better prepare various County agencies in the event of bio-terrorism or other public health emergencies.

PHEP Accomplishments 2022

- For the Fiscal year ending 6/30/2022, the MCHD received approximately \$62,560 for Public Health Emergency Preparedness.
- A new Fiscal year began on 7/1/2022, with the grant totaling \$62,000 for Public Health Emergency Preparedness.
- Continued to assist in coordination of the Meigs County Health Department's Response to the COVID-19 Pandemic.
- Passed all MARCS (ODH) radio communications exercises.
- Assisted with a successful flu vaccination clinic on 10/29/2022 at the Meigs County Farmers' Market.
- MARCS radios were provided from the Ohio Department of Health to help with communications in Meigs County and throughout the state. Six new Kenwood radios replaced 15-year-old Motorola radios.
- Continued as a member of the Meigs County Healthcare Coalition (MCHC).
- Continued as a member of the Meigs County Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC).
- Continued as a member of the Meigs County School Safety Council.
- Used the Ohio Public Health Communication System (OPHCS) to communicate MCHD weather delays and other information of note.
- Organization was greatly improved after more shelving was added to the MCHD exterior storage building, which houses the Blu-Med mobile hospital trailer, the vaccine trailer, the newly purchased truck, and other preparedness equipment.

MRC Accomplishments 2022


- Assisted with a successful flu-vaccination clinic on 10/29/2022 at the Meigs County Farmers' Market.

The Maternal & Child Health Program (MCHP) is an organized community effort to eliminate health disparities, improve birth outcomes, and improve the health status of women, infants, and children in Ohio. The Ohio Department of Health currently funds 58 projects in 64 counties across Ohio.

Adolescent Health and Resiliency

The 2022 grant funding for this program, which changes focus every 3-5 years, was used to support adolescent electronic cigarette/vaping prevention programming within our Meigs County school districts. The growing use of ecigarettes, especially by young people, has become a serious public health threat in recent years. An evidence-based youth e-cigarette prevention program titled **CATCH** *My Breath* was implemented at the three public school districts (Eastern, Meigs, and Southern), specifically at the middle school and high school level. The MCHP implemented the curriculum at Eastern Middle/High School. A partnership with another local agency, whose scope and goals also align with adolescent prevention programming, allowed this curriculum to be delivered to Meigs and Southern school districts as well, allowing a large number of area youth to receive this important health information. Program activities in 2022 also included a media campaign with messaging to alert the public of the dangers surrounding this risky behavior. This included news articles, activities at the annual Prevention Day at the Meigs County Fair, and several billboards at multiple locations within Meigs County.







Cribs for Kids® Program

- Provided safe sleep education and cribs (called a Safe Sleep Survival Kit) for 15
 Meigs County families in 2022 who did not have a safe crib for their new baby.
- Since the program's beginning in March 2015, over 100 local families have been provided with safe sleep education and a safe crib for their baby.
- Provides referrals to other mother/baby/family programs such as WIC and Help Me Grow.








